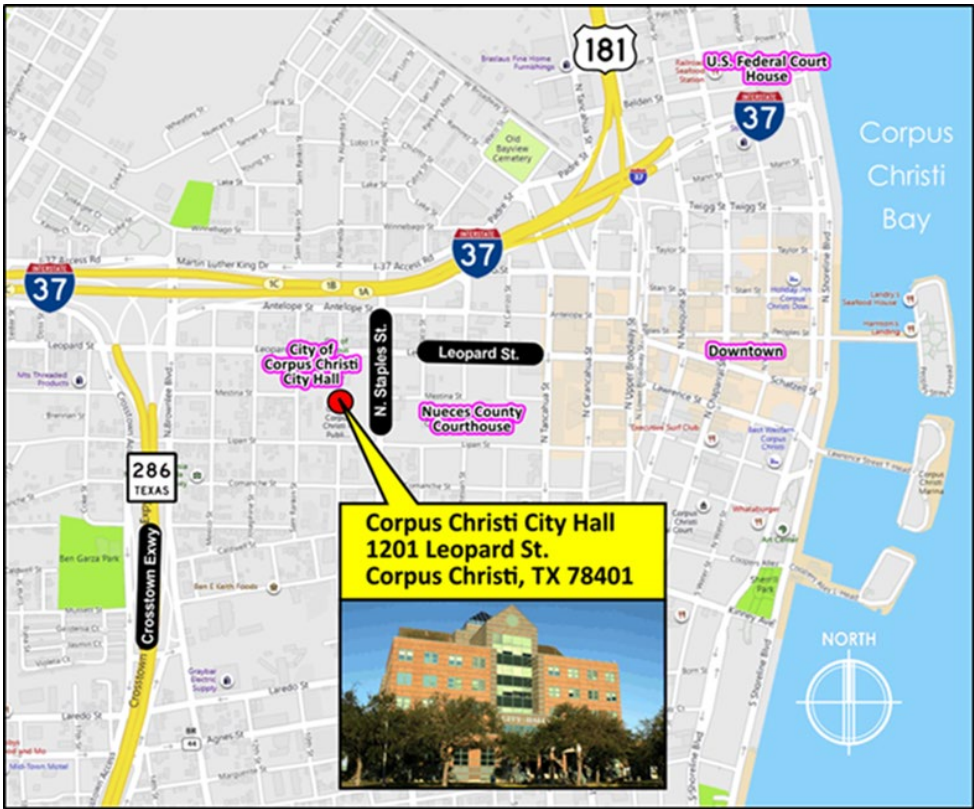

2. PUBLIC COMMENTS

None were made or offered for items not on the agenda.

3. APPROVAL OF THE TPC July 9, 2026, REGULAR MEETING MINUTES

Mr. Granado made a motion to approve the TPC **July 9, 2026** Regular Meeting minutes.

Mr. Walsh seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

Judge Scott moved **Agenda Item 6A. SH 361 Project Overview and MPO Process** up in the agenda to accommodate state delegation attendees' schedules.

6. INFORMATION ITEMS

A. SH 361 Project Overview and MPO Process

Mr. MacDonald presented this item.

In the last few weeks, there have been a few media reports and meetings concerning State Highway (SH) 361 on North Padre Island and Mustang Island, specifically related to safety and the recent fatalities on the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) roadway. The Corpus Christi Metropolitan Planning Organization (Corpus Christi MPO) was asked to add an information item for the September 3, 2026, Transportation Policy Committee (TPC) agenda to discuss this roadway.

Discussion:

Public comments were made by Texas State Senator Hinojosa, Chairman Hunter, Representative Villalobos, and Texas Transportation Commissioner Meade regarding SH 361 and the need for immediate safety improvements. Senator Hinojosa, Chairman Hunter, and Representative Villalobos signed a letter of support requesting immediate safety improvements along SH 361.

- Mr. Walsh assured the committee that TxDOT staff is working to include this item as an MTP Amendment for the next TAC meeting and to present it as an action item at the next TPC meeting.

Mr. Granado requested clarification on whether the TPC has the authority to bypass the TAC Committee's recommendation process in order to move this item forward expeditiously.

- MPO Staff responded that the TPC can act without a recommendation from the TAC, however, the one-month public comment period is still required for action items related to the MTP.

4. SPECIAL PRESENTATION – MPO OVERVIEW BY TEXAS TRANSPORTATION INSTITUTE

Mr. Robert Hazlett, from Texas A&M's Texas Transportation Institute (TTI) presented this item.

Discussion:

None. TPC members thanked Mr. Hazlett for the presentation.

5. DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION ITEMS

A. DRAFT FY 2027-2030 TIP with Amendment 1 and DRAFT 2045 MTP Update with Amendment 3

Mr. Flores introduced this item and Mr. Robert Saldaña from the CCRTA presented the requested CCRTA amendments.

The Corpus Christi Regional Transportation Authority (CCRTA) requested amendments to the Corpus Christi MPO's FY 2027-2030 TIP and 2045 MTP Update planning documents for review by the TAC, TPC, and the public.

Discussion:

None

Motion:

Mr. Walsh made a motion to release the DRAFT FY 2027-2030 Transportation Improvement Program with Amendment 1 and DRAFT 2045 Metropolitan Transportation Plan Update with Amendment 3 for a one-month public comment period.

Mr. Granado seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

B. Small Area Forecast Task Force Population and Employment Allocation for the 2050 MTP

Ms. Costanzo presented this item.

The Corpus Christi MPO Small Area Forecast (SAF) Task Force developed population and employment allocations for the year 2050. These estimates are vital components of transportation planning and a critical initial step in developing the 2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP). Forecasts of the amounts and locations of population and employment changes for the time frame of the plan (years 2025-2050) are used to identify locations, types, and severity of transportation needs.

Discussion:

Committee members questioned whether tourism during peak seasons was taken into consideration, including the additional population associated with second homes, vacation homes, and short-term rentals where multiple families may stay at one location. Members also questioned whether the seasonal increase in population along SH 361 was accounted for.

- MPO Staff responded that the peak seasonal and typical populations and related traffic counts are used by project sponsors like TxDOT in the analysis of future roadway conditions to be used in the design of facilities like SH 361. MPO Staff also noted that in the Small Area Forecast, short-term rental permits had been obtained through the City of Corpus Christi the new residential construction figures obtained for all three counties to estimate the small area

allocations of population projections incorporate all residential units, regardless of occupancy, including short term rentals and second homes.

Motion:

Mr. Walsh made a motion to approve:

1. The high growth scenario control totals for population and employment based on the Texas State Demographic Center, and
2. The population and employment forecasts for 2050 in Nueces, San Patricio and Aransas Counties' TAZs as recommended by the Small Area Forecast Task Force.

Mr. Guerra seconded; the motion passed unanimously.

6. DISCUSSION AND POSSIBLE ACTION ITEMS

B. Corpus Christi MPO Regional Coordination Group for Federal Transportation Grants Update

Ms. Costanzo presented this item.

The Corpus Christi MPO staff presents grant-related information on an ongoing basis to serve as a focus area for the Regional Coordination Group, which is the monthly Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) meeting. MPO Staff also provides monthly updates to the Transportation Policy Committee (TPC). In addition to the grants listed in Attachment 1, a handout on the PROTECT federal grant was provided to TPC members.

Discussion:

None.

7. TPC MEMBER STATEMENTS ON LOCAL AGENCY ACTIVITIES OR ITEMS OF INTEREST

Mr. Walsh announced that TxDOT is tentatively planning an open house meeting at the Island in the Sun Church regarding SH 361. The meeting will provide an opportunity for public engagement and input on concepts, ideas, and short-term safety improvement projects. The tentative meeting date is September 21, from 4:00 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. These efforts are intended to provide short-term safety improvements in the interim, while the project is being added to the MTP and funding is being secured for the project.

Mr. Granado announced that the CCRTA applied for a grant for funding for 7 buses to help replace the older buses. He also stated that the CCRTA will start construction on the maintenance facility on September 8th, and completion is estimated August 2028.

Summary

The Corpus Christi Regional Transportation Authority (CCRTA) has requested amendments to the following Corpus Christi Metropolitan Planning Organization (Corpus Christi MPO) planning documents for review by the TAC, TPC, and the public.

- FY 2027-2030 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) with Amendment 1, and
- 2045 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) Update with Amendment 3

The CCRTA requested amendments are listed in Attachment 1.

The amendment includes 25 additional CCRTA projects, all transferred to the FY 2027-2030 TIP from the FY 2025-2028 TIP with Amendment 3, totaling \$48,411,197. The Fiscally Constrained Transit Project List (Table 11) and Transit Financial Summary (Table 15) from the DRAFT 2027-2030 TIP with Amendment 1 is provided as Attachment 2 and the revised Transit Projects list from Table 7-2 of the DRAFT 2045 MTP Update with Amendment 3 is provided as Attachment 3. All three amended tables reflect the requested updates from CCRTA.

Attachment 3 also includes recently requested amendments to the Highway projects in Table 7-2 of the DRAFT 2045 MTP Update with Amendment 3, reflecting public comments received during the September 3, 2026, regular meeting of the Transportation Policy Committee (TPC) regarding safety project needs along State Highway (SH) 361 on the Island. This new project is identified as project ***MPO-082: SH 361 Mustang Island Project - Construct additional 2 travel lanes to convert existing 2-lane roadway to 4-lane divided roadway from Mariners Drive to Park Road (PR) 22.*** The construction cost estimate is **\$175,000,000**.

To maintain a fiscally constrained project list, as Federally required, the SH 286 Braid Ramp Project (MPO-036) has been moved from the Fiscally Constrained project list to Table 7-3 of additional unfunded needs, as shown in Attachment 3. These drafted amendments have been made in coordination and consultation with the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) Corpus Christi District.

In addition, Public Notice 26-5 and DRAFT Resolution 26-09 are included as Attachments 4 and 5. These documents, along with any additional public comments, will be incorporated into the documents. Specific changes are listed below:

This current request for a TIP Amendment will follow the recently revised schedule of the TxDOT FY 2027-2030 State Transportation Improvement Program's (STIP) November 2026 Revision for participating agencies, provided as Attachment 6. The former November 2026 STIP Revision is now the December 2026 STIP Revision

TxDOT Statewide STIP Revision (December 2026) Process

- The closing date for the December 2026 STIP Revision is October 16, 2026. At that time all final documents from the MPO are required to be submitted to the TxDOT eSTIP Portal.
- The Corpus Christi MPO's TPC meeting of October 1, 2026, is the meeting to approve the TIP Amendment AND the MTP Amendment by resolution as a required document to be uploaded to the TxDOT eSTIP Portal.
- The required public comment period for this TxDOT Statewide STIP Revision is November 13th through December 13th.

Corpus Christi MPO Approval Dates – TIP Amendment AND MTP Amendment

The Corpus Christi MPO scheduled dates for the TAC and TPC for actions on the TIP and MTP Amendments are:

- TAC August 20th – recommended the TPC release of the DRAFT FY 2027-2030 TIP with Amendment 1 and 2045 MTP Update with Amendment 3 documents for a required one-month public comment period.
- TPC September 3rd – released the DRAFT FY 2027-2030 TIP with Amendment 1 and 2045 MTP Update with Amendment 3 documents for a one-month public comment period.
- TAC September 17th – recommend the TPC approve the FY 2027-2030 TIP with Amendment 1 and 2045 MTP Update with Amendment 3 documents.
- TPC October 1st – Approve the FY 2027-2030 TIP with Amendment 1 and 2045 MTP Update with Amendment 3 documents by Resolution 26-09.

Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Approval Date for December 2026 STIP Revision

- FTA earliest approval date for the December 2026 STIP Revision is December 15, 2026.

Financial Impacts

No additional financial obligation is created for Corpus Christi MPO member governments beyond the local matches committed by CCRTA for the various transit projects and programs. For TxDOT, the swapping of projects also maintains the prior financial commitment from TxDOT with the identified funding Categories and required matches.

Recommendation

The TAC and the Corpus Christi MPO staff jointly recommend the TPC approve the FY 2027-2030 Transportation Improvement Program with Amendment 1 and 2045 Metropolitan Transportation Plan with Amendment 3 as presented.

Proposed Motion

Move to approve the DRAFT FY 2027-2030 Transportation Improvement Program with Amendment 1 and 2045 Metropolitan Transportation Plan Update with Amendment 3.

Background

On August 20, 2026, the CCRTA requested an amendment to the Corpus Christi MPO's FY 2027-2030 TIP. The FY 2027-2030 TIP was approved by the TPC on June 4, 2026, and submitted to TxDOT for inclusion in the new FY 2027-2030 STIP. That STIP document is still under review by the FHWA and FTA in Texas for approval. Once approved, the STIP can be amended for the first time in December 2026 following the TxDOT STIP Revision process.

Summary

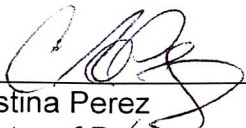

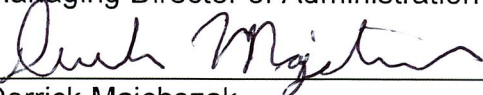

WHEREAS, the Corpus Christi Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) is the designated MPO for the Corpus Christi Metropolitan Area with responsibilities to perform regional transportation planning and programming, in cooperation with the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) and the Corpus Christi Regional Transportation Authority (CCRTA), the major transit operator; and

WHEREAS, Corpus Christi Urbanized Area has a population greater than 200,000 and has, therefore, been designated as a Transportation Management Area (TMA), and is therefore subject to special planning programming requirements regarding congestion management systems, project selection, certification; and

WHEREAS, one of the primary responsibilities of the Corpus Christi MPO is to prepare and approve a long-range regional transportation plan in accordance with the IIJA/BIL Act (23 U.S.C. 104, 134) and implementing U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) regulations (23 C.F.R. 450); and

WHEREAS, the regional transportation plan is a multi-modal transportation systems plan that defines the goals for the region and specifies the policies, projects, and strategies to help achieve these goals, and also ties the goals to performance measures to be used to track the region's progress in meeting plan goals over time; and

WHEREAS, in preparing the FY 2027-2030 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) with Amendment 1 and the 2045 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) Update with Amendment 3, the Corpus Christi MPO followed federal guidance as set out in the Metropolitan Transportation Planning rule, 23 C.F.R. 450, including consideration of the federal planning factors, identification of performance measures, and preparation of financial, environmental, and Title VI analyses of the plan and also utilized an extensive public involvement process; and

WHEREAS, the regional transportation plan is intended to guide implementing agencies in development of projects and implementation of other recommendations and supporting actions to guide improvements for all modes of transportation; and

WHEREAS, the Corpus Christi MPO abided by the required public involvement procedures in the PPP and provided one-month public review and comment period for the FY 2027-2030 TIP with Amendment 1 and 2045 MTP Update with Amendment 3 from September 3, 2026, through October 1, 2026; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED, The Transportation Policy Committee (TPC) of the Corpus Christi MPO approves the FY 2027-2030 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) with Amendment 1 for the Corpus Christi Area effective October 1, 2026;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED, The Transportation Policy Committee (TPC) of the Corpus Christi MPO approves the 2045 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP) Update with Amendment 3 for the Corpus Christi Area effective October 1, 2026; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Transportation Policy Committee (TPC) certifies the plan meets the financial constraint requirements for long-range regional transportation plans; that the federal metropolitan transportation planning process is addressing major issues facing the metropolitan area and is being conducted in accordance with all applicable federal requirements, including:

1. 23 U.S.C. 134 and 49 U.S.C. 5303, and this subpart;
2. Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended (42 U.S.C. 200d-1) and 49 C.F.R. Part 21;

Summary

The Corpus Christi Metropolitan Planning Organization (Corpus Christi MPO) staff continues development of the Chapters and Appendices of the DRAFT 2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan (MTP). Attachment 1: ***Chapter 4 – Regional Population and Employment Trends***; Attachment 2: ***Chapter 5 – Existing Transportation System Conditions*** and Attachment 3: updated ***Appendix R – CCRTA Agency Safety Plan*** are provided for review by the Transportation Policy Committee (TPC), our partner agencies, and the public. As the development of the 2050 MTP continues, there will be ongoing opportunity to update all chapters and appendices until the entire MTP is approved in April 2027.

Once TPC approves the document for use in the DRAFT 2050 MTP development and public process, staff will make it available on our website. The Corpus Christi MPO's Social Pinpoint public outreach website for the DRAFT 2050 MTP will continue to be updated with draft Chapters and Appendices as they become available.

The current DRAFT 2050 MTP Chapters and Appendices available for review and to receive public comment are:

- ***Chapter 4 – Regional Population and Employment Trends***
- ***Chapter 5 – Existing Transportation System Conditions***
- ***Appendix R – CCRTA Agency Safety Plan (August 2026)***

Background

The purpose of the 2050 MTP is to identify how the region intends to invest in the transportation system. Federal law requires that the plan "include both long-range and short-range strategies/actions that provide for the development of an integrated intermodal transportation system to facilitate the efficient movement of people and goods in addressing current and future transportation demand."

The 2050 MTP is one of the MPO's core documents that is updated every five years and plans for a 25-year time horizon. It is developed through public outreach and stakeholder engagement. The document addresses how roadways, transit, nonmotorized transportation, and intermodal connections are able to improve the operational performance of the multimodal transportation system. The 2050 MTP must cover performance measures and targets and include a report evaluating whether the condition and performance of the transportation system is meeting those targets. As such, ***Chapter 4 – Regional***

Population and Employment Trends and **Chapter 5 – Existing Transportation System Conditions** both play an important role in the development of the 2050 MTP.

The draft of **Chapter 4 – Regional Population and Employment Trends** incorporates the recently TPC-adopted 2050 population and employment projections as well as identifies more recent historical demographic and employment trends to assist with the analysis and identification of potential current and future transportation system improvements.

The draft of **Chapter 5 – Existing Transportation System Conditions** provides an overview of current and recent trends including crashes, congestion, pavement and bridge conditions, pedestrian and bicycle infrastructure, airport passenger data, and regional freight information.

Appendix R – CCRTA Agency Safety Plan is an update from the 2025 to the August 2026 document recently adopted by CCRTA Board of Directors.

Recommendation

The Corpus Christi MPO staff and the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) jointly recommend the TPC approve **Chapter 4 – Regional Population and Employment Trends**, **Chapter 5 – Existing Transportation System Conditions**, and **Appendix R – CCRTA Agency Safety Plan** of the DRAFT 2050 MTP for use in the DRAFT 2050 MTP development and public outreach processes.

Summary

The federal Surface Transportation Block Grant Set-Aside (STBG-SA) program corresponds to the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) Category 9 (Cat 9) funding category. This funding allows all projects and activities that were previously eligible under the Transportation Alternatives (TA) Program, encompassing a variety of smaller-scale transportation projects such as pedestrian and bicycle facilities, recreational trails, safe routes to school projects, community improvements such as historic preservation and vegetation management, and environmental mitigation related to stormwater and habitat maintenance.

The Corpus Christi MPO released a Call-For-Projects for STBG-SA funds on July 9, 2026, targeting the construction of pedestrian and bicycle infrastructure projects. The table below provides a summary of the five (5) project application submissions received. Construction costs for the five projects total to \$7 million, consisting of \$5.6 million in STBG-SA funds and \$1.4 million in local matching funds.

The Corpus Christi MPO's STBG-SA/CAT 9 allocation is approximately \$6,600,000 in federal funds for fiscal years 2027 through 2030, including carryover funds from prior fiscal years.

Final approval of awards is scheduled to occur during the regular Transportation Policy Committee (TPC) meeting on November 5th, 2026.

Subject: Adopt a Resolution to Apply for FTA Funding for Eight New 40' CNG Buses

Background

Federal Transit Administration (FTA) released a Notice of Funding Opportunity on July 27, 2026, through Grants for Buses and Bus Facilities Infrastructure Programs, which include the Grants for Buses and Bus Facilities Program and the Low or No Emission Program. The notice announced the opportunity to apply for \$610 million in FY 2026 funds for state and local governmental authorities for the purchase or lease of zero or low-emission transit buses as well as acquisition, construction, and leasing of required supporting facilities.

Grant applications are due by Monday, September 21, 2026.

CCRTA will continue to seek funding through available direct appropriations and other grant opportunities.

Identified Need

CCRTA is seeking federal funding to acquire eight 40' low-emission CNG buses to replace 40' buses that have exceeded 500,000 miles and are past their useful life. The current buses have structural components which have degraded, even with preventative maintenance. This has led to increases in maintenance costs for CCRTA and has impacted the system's reliability.

This investment will provide dependable public transportation that connects working families to employment and expands access to economic opportunities. Improved service reliability will help riders get to work consistently, retain employment, access education and medical care, secure childcare and other essential services, and participate more fully in the regional economy.

Replacing these vehicles will reduce service disruptions, and maintenance demands while improving fleet availability and ensuring consistent service. The new buses will strengthen our ability to provide transportation during emergency evacuations, for residents without access to a personal vehicle.

CCRTA has identified GILLIG as its manufacturing partner and will procure eight OEM-certified, standard-model CNG buses without customization. CCRTA will use contract terms that expedite payments to support timely production and delivery.

CCRTA would adhere to all regulatory requirements, procurement policies and authorizations throughout the funding process.

Financial Impact

The estimated amount is \$8.53 million in total cost, with a 15% local match.

Project Estimate:

- 8 – 40' Low-Emission CNG Buses - \$8.53M

Cost Breakdown

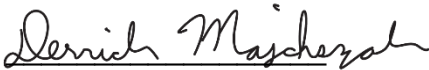

Recommendation

TxDOT awarded \$756 million for rail grade separation projects



AUSTIN – A federal grant from the Federal Railroad Administration will give the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) more than three-quarters of a billion dollars for rail grade separation projects across the state.

TxDOT will receive more than \$756 million through the National Railroad Partnership Program/Federal Railroad Administration's Federal-State Partnership for Intercity Passenger Rail (FSP) Grant Program to advance 12 critical rail grade separation projects across Texas. These awards are collectively the highest amount of any state or local recipient receiving funds.

In addition, the City of Kyle and Hays County also received awards for critical rail crossing projects in their jurisdiction.

"I have led the charge to increase funding for rail grade separation projects to keep Texans safe," said Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick. "By leveraging state funding to secure significant federal funding for rail grade separation projects, we will be able to improve rail and road safety for all Texans."

The FSP provides funding for capital projects on passenger rail lines that reduce infrastructure backlogs, improve transportation system performance and enhance rail service while increasing safety and mobility for communities. The awarded funds will support projects that eliminate crossings by constructing grade separations, removing potential conflicts between trains and roadway traffic.

"By eliminating at-grade rail crossings, we can improve safety, reduce congestion and keep people and goods moving more efficiently," said TxDOT Executive Director Marc Williams. "We thank the Federal Railroad Administration for its partnership and support through the Federal-State Partnership Program. This significant investment will allow Texas communities to advance critical infrastructure projects that enhance safety, mobility and economic opportunity."

TxDOT leveraged \$77.6 million in funding from the state's Off-System Rail Grade Separation State Fund Program to help local governments meet federal matching requirements and maximize participation in the grant program. This approach enabled more communities across Texas to compete successfully for federal funding and advance long-planned transportation improvements. Earlier this year, the Texas Transportation Commission [awarded \\$160.4 million](#) in funding from the State Fund for the elimination of five crossings.

The 12 funded projects represent a combined local-state-federal investment of more than \$953 million in communities across the state and will help deliver safer, more reliable transportation networks for Texans for years to come.
